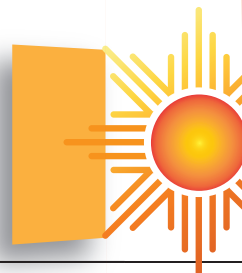

FORTY DAYS

The number forty calls for change, for transformation. AFRICAN AMERICANS AND ART

"In the fields of visual and performing arts, literature, fashion, folklore, language, film, music, architecture, culinary and other forms of cultural expression, the African American influence has been paramount. African American artists have used art to nurture history, community memory and empowerment. Artistic and cultural movements such as the New Negro, Black Arts, Black Renaissance, hip-hop, and Afrofuturism, have been led by those of African descent and set the standard for trends around the world. AFRICAN AMERICAN SCULPTOR, ED WRIGHT

Dwight, now 89, has completed about 130 public art and large-scale memorial installations, and more than 18,000 gallery sculptures.

CONGRATULATIONS TO KEVIN BOLDEN AND MARSHALL BRAUN as they celebrate the Rite of Election. Their sponsors, Kenneth Patterson and the Missionary Sisters of Charity affirm their readiness to celebrate the Easter sacraments.

On the First Sunday of Lent, the people of the Archdiocese of St. Louis gather in the Cathedral Basilica, with those seeking Baptism. With the Community of Faith, Archbishop Rozanski welcomes them into the Church.

This Rite is called election because in the rite the Church elects the choice of the catechumens, who are preparing to celebrate the sacraments of initiation, baptism, confirmation and eucharist.

At the enrollment of names Kevin and Marshall will enter their names in the Book of the Elect as their pledge to enter fully into the life of the Church through the sacraments of Initiation.

The archbishop stretches his hands over the elect and prays "Creator of all Life, bless all these chosen ones. As daughters and sons of the promise, may they rejoice in eternal life through the mystery of Your grace."

Kevin and Marshall witness a longing for communion with our God. We pray daily for Kevin and Marshall and each of us so that we, too, will be renewed in our baptismal call.

THE HEITHAUS HOMILY: On February 11, 1941, Father Claude Heithaus, S.J., began his homily with words that would change the course of Saint Louis University's history, opening its doors to African American women and men who had previously found SLU, closed by racism and segregation. The message is again stated by Father Brian Massingale, professor of theology and social ethics at Fordham University in New York.

Father Bryan Massingale, a black, gay, Catholic priest working for an inclusive Catholic church is a leader in the Catholic Church working for racial and LGBTQ justice. He says, "My whole ministry, in some way, has been to help the Church catch up to God, to help the Church understand that God has already gifted people of color with dignity and value and worth, and God has already gifted LGBTQ people with dignity, value, and worth." FASTING AND ABSTINENCE: During Lent abstinence from meat on Fridays is obligatory in the United States. Fasting requires Catholics ages 18-59 to reduce the usual amount of food eaten.

ALLIANCE TO END HUMAN TRAFFICKING: The House of Representatives is expected to vote this week on a critically important piece of anti-human trafficking legislation, H.R. 5856, the Frederick Douglass Trafficking Victims Prevention and Protection Reauthorization Act.

"This legislation is critical for continuing and bolstering our nation's efforts to eradicate human trafficking and assist human trafficking survivors".
