## AFRICAN AMERICANS ON THE PATH TO SAINTHOOD



Herriette DeLille (1813-62) the foundress of the Sisters of the Holy Family, New Orleans. Her father was from France, and her mother was a free woman of African descent. She applied to both the Ursuline and Carmelite communities and was refused. She used her family money to found her own community, which cared for the sick and poor and opened schools. She is the first native-born American of African descent whose cause for canonization was opened.

**Pierre Toussaint** (1766-1853) was born in Haiti and came to New York City as a slave. He became a hairdresser. He prospered and

was able to secure his freedom. He was a daily communicant, and with his wife, Marie Rose Juliette, engaged in charitable works. New York's Cardinal John O'Connor initiated his cause for canonization in 1991 and declared "Venerable" by Pope St. John Paul II in 1996.

Pierre's remains are interred in New York's St. Patrick's Cathedral in the cathedral crypt alongside of New York's most prominent Catholic leaders, the only layman afforded this privilege.

BLACK CATHOLIC HISTORY MONTH: This tradition began in 1990 by the National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus. November celebrates days for two African Catholics: St. Augustine, birthday November 13 and St. Martin de Porres, feast day, November 3. These saints have witnessed their faith, ministered to their people, and left lasting legacies in the face of prejudice, ignorance, and indifference.

### A LEADING LIGHT IN EARLY CHRISTENDOM:

Three popes were born in Africa: Saints Victor I, Melchiades, and Gelasius I. Each shepherded the early church through tumultuous times. Early Black Saints: Cyprian, Zeno, Anthony of Egypt, Moses the Black, Pachomius, Maurice, Athanasius, Pisentius, Mary of Egypt, Cyril of Alexandria, Monica of Hippo, Augustine of Hippo, Perpetua, Felicitas, and Thecla were mystics, monastic, and martyrs.
